Heart to Heart

I used to think having paid singers in a church choir was unnecessary, but I have changed my mind. Sometimes paid singers make a wonderful difference in the choir ministry and outreach. Some argue that paid section leaders guarantee consistency, a balance of voices, and high quality music. But this conversation is about guests who occasionally sing with the choir.

I appreciate our volunteer Chancel Choir. Worship is stronger when they sing with the congregation. I tell them this and always rejoice when they return from summer break. But there have been changes since I arrived that are challenging for both choir and director. They have lost eleven singers. One moved. Six are no longer able to sing for whatever reason. And four are now members of the heavenly choir. Our Chancel Choir feels this loss. It makes it difficult to sing more challenging music, like cantatas for example. And yet, the choir enjoys singing cantatas at Christmas and Easter. They want to be part of music that moves you, that fills your hearts with joy. But the hard truth is this. The Chancel Choir does not have the voices at this time to do cantatas without paid singers.

And, if we do not do a cantata, we give up a significant community outreach. Do you remember the recent Cantata Sunday crowds? In 2014, there were 128 worshipers; in 2015, 116; and in 2016, 120. Worship attendance spiked on a third Sunday in Advent due to the Christmas Cantata.

There are some additional benefits I should mention. Paid singers give confidence to volunteer singers, especially those who love to sing but cannot read music. And if the choir sounds better because of the pro voices, more people come on board as volunteers. Four volunteer singers joined our Chancel Choir after first singing in one of the cantatas. I changed my mind about guest singers a long time ago. I decided the benefits to the church and choir outweigh the small cost, considering the increased giving on high attendance Sundays and the fact that the cost is frequently covered by designated funds.

Singers can make a world of difference! The king, in the Book of Nehemiah, thought so too. So he commanded that the singers be paid every day their portion of the frankincense, the vessels, and the tithes of grain, wine, and oil.

The Stewardship Committee thanks the congregation of First United Methodist Church, Canoga Park, for their response to our 2018 stewardship program, "Compassion and Community." Our compassion is for those in need in our West San Fernando Valley community and around the world, as well as everyone who is carrying out God's work.

Whatever the church does is done by you, and through your generous giving, we support the hungry with the Food Pantry, the Shower Ministry for those living with homelessness, the Boy Scouts to encourage kids in their dreams, and other targeted ministries. We've been doing these things since our founding over a hundred years ago.

Remembering Jack Taylor 11 July 1934 - 18 October 2017

Raymond "Jack" Taylor was born on 11 July 1934 in Chicago, Illinois. When he was nine, he moved to the San Fernando Valley with his mom and sister. The family followed several of his parents' friends to live in a nicer climate. His dad was in the army at that time, serving in Alaska.

Jack attended local public schools and graduated from Van Nuys High School in 1952. He worked for General Motors in Van Nuys and

Lockheed in Burbank, before he was drafted into the US Army. He was sent to Germany for two years; his unit replaced the occupation troops.

After his tour of duty, Jack returned to his job at Lockheed. Then, he took a job in newspaper circulation. Over a period of twenty-five years, Jack worked for several newspapers, ending his career with the Los Angeles Times, as an independent dealer, working seven days a week. Finally, he went into business for himself and retired with Pat in 2003.

Pat's good friend, Bobbi, was going with Jack's friend, so she sent Jack over to meet Pat. They went to Disneyland on their first date in May 1959 and were married on 7 September 1960. Jack and Pat raised two daughters, Gail and Chris. Jack and his true love were married for fifty-seven years.

During those years, they lived in Sherman Oaks, Van Nuys, and, for the last seventeen years, in Calabasas. They attended Methodist churches in Sherman Oaks and North Hollywood. When they decided to find a church family closer to home, they joined First UMC of Canoga Park in 2013. Pat promptly joined the choir, and Jack held down an his seat in the third pew.

Jack is survived by his beloved wife, Pat; daughter, Gail Taylor; daughter, Chris Taylor, and son-in-law, Jim Feldman; two grandsons, Sam and Ben Taylor-Feldman; and his sister, Lorelea Holford, as well as nieces and nephews.

Jack was funny, maybe even a bit goofy. He made up silly rhymes, sang silly songs and delighted his grandchildren with ad-libbed stories and poems. He

was also stubborn; when his mind was made up, it was his way or the highway. The girls remember Dad had a remedy for every injury; it was the magic stuff, otherwise known as Bactine.

Jack had a life-long obsession with cars; he owned and retooled many. Phone conversations with the girls often included questions like, "How many miles do you have on your car?" or "Did you get your oil changed?" He could build and fix anything. He made little inventions to

solve problems and loved puttering around.

Jack was bald very young, so he always had a toupee. Consequently, there are toupee stories. One time, they thought the dog had a critter of some kind, but the dog was chewing Jack's toupee. Another time, Jack was riding his motorcycle down the street and looking cool, when his hair flew up and flapped a bit.

Jack, a strong Democrat, was active in the Valley Grassroots for Democracy. He was always honest and never cheated anyone. He was very loyal and enjoyed socializing.

Pat and Jack loved traveling to many destinations, including Europe, Hawaii, Italy, Egypt, and Iceland. They frequented Lake Tahoe and took cruises.

The Apostle Paul said, "For we know that if the earthly tent we live in is destroyed, we have a building from God, a house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens. So we are always confident; even though we know that while we are at home in the body we are away from the Lord." Like Paul, Jack had confidence, and he would rather be away from the body and at home with the Lord. He wasn't afraid of dying; he just wanted to die at home in his favorite chair. And thanks be to God, that's how Jack came to be absent from the body, present with the Lord!
